#### Welcome to Kid Grid!

#### **About**

Kid Grid is a part of the Mental Wellness Project, a solutions-focused reporting project of the Southwest Michigan Journalism Collaborative. As part of our spring 2023 youth reporting series, *A Way Through: Strategies for Youth Mental Health*, this guide was produced to help parents and youth learn more about where to access mental health services based on level of need, geographic proximity, services needed and insurance, Medicaid or payment information.

The Mental Wellness Project is a solutions-oriented journalism initiative covering mental health issues in Southwest Michigan, created by the Southwest Michigan Journalism Collaborative.

#### **How to Use**

Kid Grid provides an easy-to-read grid to quickly preview service options. The listing at the end of the document has more details on mental health services, listed alphabetically by provider. This guide also includes a listing of inpatient facilities for youth with more severe mental health issues.

## What's Included

**General Flow Chart** — see how the process may unfold based on your child's needs (from immediate/crisis situations to moderate mental health concerns)

"My child needs help" — read a quick summary of what to expect around first steps, mental health services access points and links, age of consent and insurance companies.

**Kid Grid Chart** — find what organizations may be able to provide services based on a child's specific need.

**Youth Outpatient Resources** — read more details on the outpatient organizations and their specific services.

**Youth Inpatient Resources** — review the inpatient facilities for youth in the state and where they are located.

**Contact Listing** — find names, addresses and services of the outpatient organizations mentioned in this guide, with more detail on what services are provided (alphabetical listing).

**Terms & Definitions** — learn about the common terms and acronyms that might be helpful as you seek services

NOTE: This is not meant to be a replacement for contact with your child's pediatrician and school system, which are often the first connections made in seeking mental health services. Private practice therapy and counseling were not listed unless an organization provides culturally specific services or diagnostically specific services. School-based services are also not part of this listing.

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

## 'My child needs help'

## First steps

If you have concerns about your child's mental health, emotional well-being or behaviors, the best place to start is to speak with your child's doctor about possible causes and next steps. Your child's school also may be able to recommend resources and start educational interventions. Your child may need to have a mental health diagnosis to receive some services, both in the community and at school. Often, your child's pediatrician can diagnose minor to moderate issues, but other diagnoses require a mental health professional.

## Finding a therapist or provider

The reference guide below outlines some of the bigger community providers in Southwest Michigan for outpatient therapies, neuropsychological testing and other specialized treatments. If you are uninsured or have Medicaid only, start with your local Community Mental Health (CMH) agency. If you have private (commercial) insurance, ask your insurance provider for a list of covered mental health providers. Other helpful resources for finding a provider include <a href="Psychology Today">Psychology Today</a> and <a href="Michigan 2-1-1">Michigan 2-1-1</a>. Both sites allow you to narrow your search by the type of service and your zip code. You also may be able to locate support groups and treatment centers this way. Lastly, ask around: Experienced parents often can recommend exactly <a href="www.what.you.and">what you and</a> your child need.

## Age of consent for mental health treatment

Under Michigan law, minors age 14 and older can request and receive up to 12 sessions or four months of outpatient mental health services without consent or knowledge of the minor's parent or legal guardian. Minors considering mental health services should contact their local CMH. Click here for more information about Michigan's Mental Health Code Section 330.1707.

## **Outpatient referrals**

Most community agencies providing mental health or substance use disorder care will require a referral for some or all services. Many of these referral requirements are noted in the resource guide, but it is best to call ahead to inquire what is needed. For substance use disorder care through community agencies, you must be referred through <a href="Southwest Michigan">Southwest Michigan</a>
Behavioral Health (SWMBH), a partner with CMH agencies in Southwest Michigan. Call SWMBH's Substance Abuse Treatment Access line at 800-781-0353.

### **Insurance coverage**

Payments accepted by each mental health provider are outlined in the resource guide, but it is always best practice to check with your own health insurance to inquire about coverage with your chosen provider before scheduling services. Call the customer service number on the back of your insurance card. If you are uninsured or have Medicaid, your local CMH is the best place to start.

#### **Terms and Definitions**

## **CMH: Community Mental Health**

Your CMH is your local public mental health agency that serves your particular county or group of counties in Michigan. Your local CMH is the first stop for mental health assistance for those in crisis; those with serious mental health, behavioral or emotional challenges; or for those without insurance or with Medicaid only. Some CMH agencies are Certified Community Behavioral Health Clinics (CCBHC) and can serve anyone regardless of age, residency or insurance status. Many CMH agencies have rebranded under other names: Integrated Services of Kalamazoo (Kalamazoo County), Summit Pointe (Calhoun County) and Woodlands Behavioral Health Network (Cass County). These have been marked as CMH in the resource guide for clarity, as well as our regional CCBHC's.

#### **SED: Serious Emotional Disturbance**

Childhood SED is the presence of a diagnosable mental, behavioral or emotional disorder that impairs a child's ability to function and substantially interferes with family, school or community activities.

# **SEDW: Waiver for Children with Serious Emotional Disturbance**

This waiver enables Medicaid to fund necessary home- and community-based services for children with SED, regardless of insurance status. Eligible children will receive Medicaid coverage and have access to the full spectrum of available services through CMH. If you are concerned your child may have SED and could qualify for the SEDW, call the access/intake department at your county's CMH agency and ask for your child to be assessed for the SEDW. # Inpatient Facilities for Children and Adolescents Across Michigan

#### **Overview**

Inpatient psychiatric care may be recommended when a patient is having a severe mental health episode and/or poses a danger to themselves or others. Patients must be referred for inpatient care from a hospital emergency room or from a state agency such as Community Mental Health (CMH), the juvenile justice system or Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS). Most child and adolescent inpatient facilities in Michigan offer short-term care to stabilize the crisis until the patient can be safely discharged to outpatient care.

Care at an inpatient psychiatric facility typically includes 24-hour care, crisis stabilization, comprehensive assessment, psychiatric care, medical care, counseling, medication management, nursing services, interpretation services and transition services; often occupational therapy, educational services and recreational therapy also are included.

#### **Wait times**

Michigan inpatient psychiatric beds for children and teens are few. Wait times for an inpatient bed are common and change day to day. Staff levels, bed availability, referral status, eligibility requirements, and a child's particular needs all contribute to this complicated equation. Most facilities do not keep wait lists, but prioritize admission on a case-by-case basis. Parents with children needing inpatient mental health care should brace themselves to wait anywhere from a few days to several weeks for a bed.

## **Referrals**

As mentioned above, patients must be referred for inpatient care from a hospital emergency room or from a state agency such as CMH, the juvenile justice system or MDHHS. Many facilities prioritize or only take patients

referred from these agencies. The resource guide makes mention of these requirements.

## Where to stay

This resource guide lists inpatient facilities across the state of Michigan, as inpatient beds for children and adolescents are scarce. That means it is likely a family in need of this type of care for their child will need to travel. Ronald McDonald Houses are free places to stay for families of children ages 0-18 who are being treated at a nearby hospital or facility. Click here to find a house program near your location, or contact the social services department at the facility where your child will receive care to inquire about Ronald McDonald Houses or possible discounted hotel rooms.


